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Wastewater Tips & Reminders

GREASE—DO NOT pour grease down any drains. This includes kitchen sinks, dishwashers, toilets and any other pipe that is connected to your sewer pipe. The grease will end up in your sewer line and can result in a backup.

VENT CAPS—DO NOT bury your vent caps. The vent makes is easier for the sewer gases to get outside of your home rather than being released in your home. They are also how oxygen finds its way into the waste pipes so bacteria can break down.

WIPES—We DO NOT recommend flushing these items down the toilet. Even though they are advertised as flushable, the reality is quite the opposite. The material used is not biodegradable, and can cause significant obstructions in your sewer pipes and at the pump stations.

Right-of-Ways/Easements—If you have a sewer Right-of-Way or an Easement on your property please keep the area clear so that we can enter and maintain the sewer line. These areas should not have any structures such as sheds, fences, pools, trees, plantings, ponds, etc.

PA One Call System

Know what's below. Dial 8—1—1 before you dig or call 1-800-242-1776. You can also visit their website at **www.paonecall.org** and submit your request online. There is NO fee to the property owner for this service. You may think you know where all underground utilities are located. It is better to be safe rather than sorry.

The Township and the Police Dept. both have a 24 hour exterior drop off box. The phone number for county dispatch is listed on the Police Dept. door for after hour office needs:

SEWER BILLING

You should have already received your May sewer bill in the mail. If you did not receive your bill, please call the Township Office for your balance.

All sewer bills are due Friday, June 10th.

If you are paying in person you will need to be in our office by 4:00 pm on June 10th.

You may place your payment in the 24 hour drop box located in the front of our building just to the right of the main doors. Payments must be in the drop box by 7:30 am June 11th, the next business day to be considered "on time".

You can send your payment in the mail. If you are mailing your payment, please allow <u>plenty</u> of time for the mail to arrive in our office.

You may also pay your bill online using the sewer payment portal located on our website's home page (www.northlebanontwppa.gov). Any payments made online must be paid by midnight on June 10th to be considered "on time".

Your **check must be in a cashable state**, meaning your check must be signed, filled in correctly, and there must be sufficient funds in the account. If any of these things are not correct, the penalty process will begin.

We continue to receive checks where the digit amount does not match the written amount. It is the bank's legal position to accept the amount written out. If this happens you may incur late fees and penalties. It is your responsibility to insure your check is in a "cashable" state and is made out in the correct amount due.

Late fees **CANNOT** be waived as per policy.

You receive a quarterly invoice from the <u>North</u> <u>Lebanon Township Municipal Authority</u> for your sewer usage. This bill is for your **sewer usage** as well as operation and maintenance of the sewer system.

If you are connected to public water, you also receive a separate bill from the <u>*City of Lebanon Authority*</u> for your **water usage**. This bill is only for your water consumption.

Please be aware that these are two separate entities at two different locations.

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Stormwater runoff pollution and how to reduce it

Stormwater runoff is rain that falls on streets, parking areas, sports fields, gravel lots, rooftops or other developed land and flows directly into nearby lakes, rivers and streams. The drizzling or pounding rain picks up and mixes with what's on the ground. Oil, grease, metals and coolants from vehicles, fertilizers, pesticides and other chemicals from gardens and homes, bacteria from pet wastes and failing septic systems, soil from construction sites and other bare ground, soaps from car or equipment washing, and accidental spills, leaky storage containers, tobacco spit and whatever else ends up on the ground. The polluted runoff then rushes into nearby gutters and storm drains and into streams, lakes, rivers and bays. In most areas, stormwater runoff enters these waters without being cleaned of pollutants.

Why is stormwater a problem?

Across the U.S., unmanaged stormwater runoff has caused serious damage to streams, lakes and estuaries, particularly where land uses change from rural to urban activities. Stormwater runoff can also contaminate drinking water supplies.

Poorly managed stormwater causes three big problems

Pollution from stormwater contaminates our waters, closes local businesses, and harms or kills fish and other wildlife. As stormwater passes over developed land, it picks up pollutants and transports them to the nearest storm drain and eventually streams, rivers and bays. Flooding harms streams and wetlands and destroys habitats needed for fish and other wildlife. Unable to soak into the ground, stormwater quickly flows or floods downstream from developed land during the rainy season. As a result, floods can damage homes and businesses, flood septic system drain fields and overwhelm streams, wetlands and wildlife habitat. Water shortages in growing communities may occur, especially in developed areas where water cannot filtrate through, such as roads, parking lots and rooftops. These surfaces keep rainfall from soaking into the ground and replenishing groundwater and streams used for drinking water or fish habitat.

What can you do?

It is a problem that everyone plays a part in solving. It is a problem that residents can change by stopping small, individual activities that cause pollution and result in large-scale pollution. It is a problem that communities can manage to prevent stormwater runoff as development takes place. You can do a lot to help minimize stormwater problems.

Start with doing one of the actions on the following list:

- 1. Maintain your car or truck. Never dump anything down a storm drain. Always recycle used oil, antifreeze and other fluids. Fix oil leaks in your vehicles.
- 2. Wash your car at a commercial car wash rather than in the street or in your driveway. If you wash your car at home, wash it on your lawn.
- 3. Drive less. Leave your car at home at least one day each week and take a bus, carpool or bike to work. Combine errands when you drive. Get vehicle emissions checked and repaired.
- 4. Cut down on fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. If you use these chemicals, follow directions and use them sparingly. Don't fertilize before a rainstorm. Let your lawn go golden brown in the summer months; it will rebound in the fall. Compost or mulch lawn clippings. Preserve existing trees or plant new ones trees hold rainfall and help manage stormwater.
- 5. If you are on a septic system, maintain the system. Septic systems require regular inspections, maintenance and pumping, or they will fail, cost a lot of money to fix and could pollute nearby lakes and streams. Have a professional inspector check your system regularly and have it pumped out when needed.
- Pick up after your pets and keep animals out of streams. Scoop your dog's poop and properly dispose of it. Make sure fences and other structures are keeping cows, horses and other animals out of streams. Compost manure in a designated area so that it doesn't wash off into nearby waterways.
- 7. Reduce impervious surfaces at home and increase the vegetated land cover of your property. Impervious surfaces include your roof, driveway, patios and lawn. Reduce rooftop runoff by directing your down-spouts to vegetated areas, and not to the storm drain on your street. For your driveway and patios, consider putting in permeable paving or patterns of cement and brick that allow water to filter through it.

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TREE DEDICATION

Consider adopting a tree in memory of a loved one. We have trees available at Lenni Lenape and at the Township Community Park. We recently added additional shade trees surrounding the playground and pavilion area at Lenni Lenape. There are many varieties available for

you to choose from. The cost is \$300 per tree. You can also purchase a plaque from our preapproved designs which we will install free of charge.
